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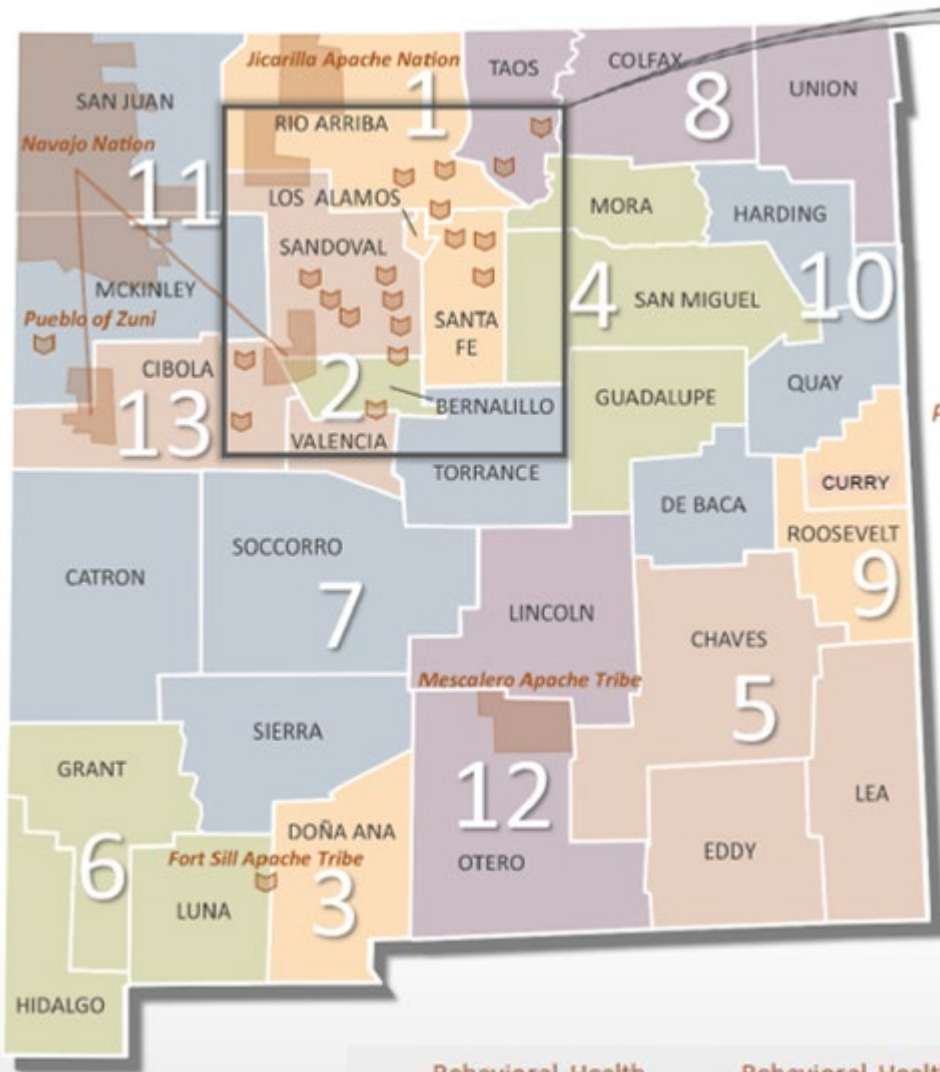

Section 24A-10-2(A) NMSA 1978

"behavioral health region" means a geographic area of the state that is designated in accordance with Subsection B of Section 3 of the Behavioral Health Reform and Investment Act and encompasses one or more counties or judicial districts;

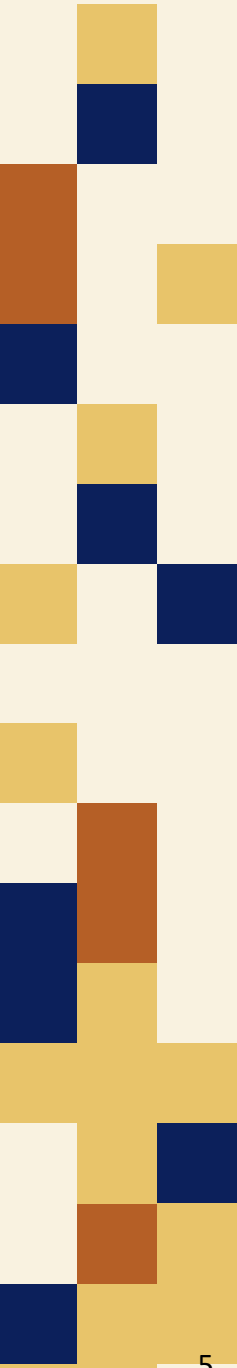
Promote sustainability

Accountable Entity Timeline: Key Milestones from Start to Finish

Application Phase

Requesting County Managers and Tribal leadership to identify 1 lead governmental or quasi-government entity per Behavioral Health Region (13)

Planning Phase

Establishing the BH Regional Stakeholder Planning Committee and beginning planning their BH Regional Workshop

Listening Phase

Each BH Region will host virtual listening session from community to inform planning priorities

Convening Phase

Each BH Region will host a workshop and vote on up to 5 priorities

Plan Development Phase

Identifying and defining programs under each selected behavioral health priority, then integrating them into a comprehensive Behavioral Health Plan

Plan Submission Phase

Submit to the Executive for review and approval
